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

Bath was Soaring High in 2022! 11 hot air balloons participated in the event

Following a three-year hiatus, the Village of Bath as well as local residents were thrilled to have the River Bend Balloon Fest back to the Bath Fair Grounds in 2022. A total of 11 hot air balloons participated in the event which took place September 1-5, 2022.

Balloon pilots from Canada, USA and the United Kingdom brought their colourful hot air balloons to the Bath Fair Grounds, and provided an awe-inspiring view of our community. Whether you were on the ground marveling in the colourful display, or inside one of the baskets taking in a bird's eye view, the event was a hit with everyone.

Since the balloons need cool air temperatures to take flight, people were able to book for either a 6:30 a.m. flight, or a 5:30 p.m. flight. Flights lasted anywhere from one to one and a half hours.

Those who were unsure if they wanted to commit to a full flight, could enjoy a tethered ride, where the balloon was tied to the ground. The balloons would ascend several feet into the air, and gracefully drift back down.

The 2022 event also included local vendors and entertainers in an outdoor market on Saturday, September 3, while a Motorcycle and Antique Car Show gave everyone the opportunity to show off their rides on Sunday.

Events like this would not be possible without volunteer support. Many people stepped up by volunteering to crew a balloon, which gave them an up-close and personal experience. Meet the New Family Physician in Town

Availability of medical equipment will help with physician recruitment

Construction of the District of Carleton North's newest medical clinic was completed recently and is located on the corner of McCain Street and Centennial Crescent

Thanks to funding received from the Carleton North Community Foundation, the Florenceville Rotary Club, the Harrison McCain Foundation, and the McCain Foundation, medical equipment was able to be purchased to outfit the new space to help with physician recruitment. The equipment is owned by the municipality and is to be made available to physicians who choose to practice there.

Dr. Stuart Lockhart, from Bath, is the first physician to practice in the new space. He and his partner Maily moved to Carleton North from Saskatchewan late last year and will operate the




new clinic. Dr. Lockhart completed his medical degree at Trinity College Dublin, School of Medicine in Ireland in 2019 and residency training at the University of Saskatchewan in 2021. He began full-time practice in North Battleford, SK thereafter before relocating to New Brunswick. His practice focuses on preventative medicine and comprehensive primary care.

Mrs. Lockhart, from Edmonton, will oversee nonclinical operations. Maily holds a Master of Public Health from the University of Saskatchewan and has an extensive background in healthcare administration, health innovation and technology, and public health which will lend itself to physician recruitment and smooth operations of the new clinic. She also works as a health administrator for Horizon Health Network.

Their goal is to develop a collaborative, teambased practice that is attractive for practitioners and meets the needs of the community. In a team-based practice, physicians and nurse practitioners can provide cross-coverage for continued care of patients if absent from the office. A collaborative work setting ensures practitioners have room to develop in their careers in a supportive environment.

Aside from nurse practitioners and physicians, space is available for ancillary health services common in primary care like dieticians, chronic disease nursing, etc, as well



as any potential visiting specialists that can be

The foundational support for the equipment purchase has been an integral part to this project, without which this project would not be possible. This equipment will serve as an incentive for new practitioners in the recruitment process. Among the new pieces purchased by the District of Carleton North include examination tables, examination lamps, infant and adult scales, wall mounted diagnostic scopes, bariatric furniture, a defibrillator and various other diagnostic equipments.

Public Washroom Coming to Riverside Park

A key component to the site's Revitalization Plan



The Town of Florenceville-Bristol received \$268,115 toward a \$668,115 project from the Regional Development Corporation, through the Rural Economy Fund. The balance of project cost will come directly from the Town to complete phase one of Riverside Park and Shogomoc Site Revitalization.

One of the key components to the project was the addition of a public washroom at the site. Tender requests went out in late 2022, with the contract being awarded to K-Line Construction for \$393,450 plus HST.

The contract included construction of the washroom building, boat launch parking lot and road repairs, plus pruning and clearing for future lookouts.

The building will be located between the Park and the Shogomoc Railway Station, making it centrally located for those enjoying the summer market, getting ready for a paddle from the boat launch, going for a stroll on one of the new walking paths, or stopping for a break when snowmobiling during the winter months.

Construction will begin in the spring, with an anticipated completion in July.

Potato World Revitalization

Tourist attraction undergoing transformation with tri-level funding

Potato World was constructed 17 years ago as a museum to ensure the local history of the potato wouldn't get lost. While it has served tourists very well, it needed some upgrades to entice even more visitors to celebrate the Town's French Fry Capital of the World® brand and contribute to the overall economic development of the surrounding community.

Being one of Florenceville-Bristol's key tourist attractions, Potato World realized improving on operations and maximizing space was instrumental to their longevity. Their goal is to improve the overall visitor experience, while continuing to educate and tell "The Heritage of Farming" story.

The project will start by creating a strong new sense of arrival as soon as visitors arrive on the property. New signage, updates to the building façade, including adding windows and a welcoming archway will set the stage for what awaits!

Once inside, visitors will be greeted with a new

look that includes a library balcony along with interactive displays to help increase interactivity within the museum. Family-friendly experiences will be developed to include a potato-gun shooting range, farm-themed playground, ride-on pedal tractors, an observation deck, and pergola.

The open-air courtyard will be transformed into a safe and secure area to enjoy activities of all sorts such as crafts and storytelling! Adding speakers and umbrellas will enhance the comfort and offer protection from the elements, while increasing appeal to participate in a variety of fun-filled options.

To better position itself as a key travel motivator, the museum hours will be extended to 7 days a week during the peak season.

Potato World received \$350,000 funding from ACOA, \$350,000 from Regional Development Corporation (RDC), \$20,000 from the Town of Florenceville-Bristol through the Community Grant, and the balance from local supporters.

This revitalized attraction will provide an environment that will attract and motivate people of all ages to learn about the importance of the potato in the past, present and future.

Attractions like this are important to the success of Florenceville-Bristol, as well as the entire District of Carleton North.



A New Council for a New Municipality

Laying the groundwork for a busy term ahead

With Municipal Reform nearing completion, the municipal elections took place November 28, 2022 in most municipalities across the province, including in our new town called the District of Carleton North. The province had mandated the Council's term and new municipalities would come into effect January 1, 2023. Our Mayor and Council were therefore sworn in December 13, so they could be ready to do business at the start of the New Year.

The first piece of business at the January 2023 Council meeting for the District of Carleton North was to appoint the Deputy Mayor. Councillor At Large Karen Hargrove was nominated for the position, and with no other names brought forward, Councillor Hargrove was appointed Deputy Mayor for this election

The next order of business was the creation of several committees in order to address various services and priorities throughout the District of Carleton North.

First Entrepreneurship Incentive Plan Recipient

Magen Brennan is an entrepreneur and founder of Pure Therapy Clinic. As a Registered Sports Massage Therapist for over seven years. She created her business from the ground up in Bristol by providing Neuromuscular Massage Therapy as her focus in her practice to the area. As her business grew, she recognized a need for more mindfulness services that aligned with her existing practice and wanted to offer these benefits to locals and newcomers as well as attract tourists.

She sought out the Town of Florenceville-Bristol's Tourism & Business Development Manager, Bobbie O'Donnell, who signed Magen up for the Town's Class of One mentoring program. Two mentors from one business in Ontario were matched up with Magen. They provided insight and how to dial in on her business plan focusing on Tourism aspects for Pure Therapy's additional location at 6 Welch Street. The three met five times over two months after in-depth conversations, homework, and many late nights for Magen.

Following the successful completion of the Class of One program, Magen, her husband Luke Brennan, and all locally sourced contractors have been able to focus on transforming a vacant church for over 15 years into a unique experience for locals and tourists alike.



In the Fall of 2022, she submitted her application to the Town's Entrepreneurship Incentive Plan, which provided financial support for capital assistance. Demonstrating her skillsets with her existing business, along with her Class of One graduation, she was awarded a \$10,000 non-repayable grant from the Town.

The unique architectural structure of the 1909 United Baptist Church includes an Airbnb Loft that can accommodate up to six people, while the main floor will offer beginner to intermediate yoga classes such as Aerial, Flow, Yin, and meditation, along with other courses centered around wellness and events.

The space will also offer a Mini Nordic Spa for those looking to retreat to reduce stress, reconnect

and become more mindful. Pure Therapy Retreat will provide the ultimate tourist experience for those visiting from out of Town, while also providing a modern and exciting spot for locals to reconnect with the community and attend unique events offered by Pure Therapy Retreat's event space with an onsite beverage room serving beer on tap, wine, non-alcoholic beverages, and snacks. Pure Therapy Retreat also believes inclusivity is essential, so their main floor, bathroom, and patio are wheelchair accessible for all to enjoy.


Lots of Snow Blast Fun!

Special garbage days are scheduled in the spring and fall, with the next one June 1.

Zone 3: Centreville

Special garbage days are scheduled in the spring and fall, with the next ones May 23 & 30.


Zone 3: Florenceville-Bristol

Special garbage days are scheduled in the spring and fall, with the next one May 4.

Zone 4: Aberdeen, Brighton, Coldstream, Glassville, Kent, Upper Kent, Mount Pleasant, Juniper & Knowlesville

There are no special garbage pick-up days scheduled for these areas. Instead, residents must call Kearney's/ Bellis a minimum of a week prior to let them know they have big garbage, and what it contains of. *Please note it cannot be collected the week of recycling or the week after recycling due to high volumes of disposal.
